Guest Presenter — Alan Miotke

We started our first meeting of the year with a guest woodturner and artist Alan Miotke. He demonstrated different ways he embellishes his work. Alan is self taught (a lot of trial and error) with no formal training in carving or painting. To get some ideas for his design on textures he takes pictures of things in nature and looks at them closely to see all the different detail and color. He also save leaves, twigs and pieces of bark so he can look at the different colors and feel the textures. He also uses Google to search for images of bark, coral, and sand dunes for different textures. Alan has many tools in his shop and he stressed to have good LED lighting, magnifying glasses for detail work, a dusk mask, and an air filter system. A Dremel with a flex shaft or a Micromotor is a good place to start for carving your piece. A high speed pneumatic (what a dentist uses) works for very light detail work and cuts any wood like butter but is pricy. He then explained all the different carving tips and when to use them. Next Alan went into the different painting processes he uses. He talked about color theory and if you have the three primary colors red, yellow, blue plus black and white you can create an infinite number of colors. He showed a color wheel and explained the different color hues and color compliments. Alan finishes the inside of his bowl first then if any paint gets on the inside you can wipe it off. Starting with the darkest color he then uses a dry brush technique to add a lighter color. Some of his pieces have up to 14 different layers of color. To get a burnt look he uses a torch and to get a rusty iron look he uses Modern Masters paint from Craft Supplies. You need to use the Modern Master primer to get the correct look. To get a moss look he runs sawdust thru a strainer then uses Titebond glue and mixes in the sawdust, then he applies it to the piece and lets it dry. After it dries he paints it green. To get an iron look (1/3 microfine graphite, 1/3 lacquer, 1/3 lacquer thinner) make a slurry and brush it on your piece (it will have a dull finish) then burnish your work and it will look like pitted iron. It was great to see Alan's demonstration and it brought up a lot of discussion on color, tools, and techniques. Alan was also kind enough to critique our gallery items and he gave suggestions on how to use different textures and coloring techniques to make the piece pop.

American Association of Woodturner Grants

Each year the AAW awards financial grants to members of the AAW. As club members you are eligible to apply for these grants. Regular grants are awarded once each year and applications for regular grants must be received by December 31 of the preceding year. Applications received after December 31 will be considered for the next calendar year.
